Sunny Slope Orchard Clean Water Farm Award

The Boswells have excluded cattle from the farm's seven ponds and installed 20,760 feet of stream exclusion fencing. Their farm was the site for several tours for legislative partners, and for the District's Local Envirothon. The Department of Conservation & Recreation award was presented by Director Ricky Rash, left, to the farm's manager John Boswell, Jr., and Lynne and John "Jack" Boswell.



Billy & Barbara Thompson Conservation Farmer Prince Edward County

Director Wilkie Chaffin, left, presented Billy and Barbara Thompson a Conservation Farmer Award, accompanied by their daughter-in-law Vicky, son Thomas and their two grandsons sons Aeda and Sean. The couple has installed 3,163 feet of cattle exclusion fencing and created alternative watering facilities in seven paddocks that their cattle and goats rotate thru following a NRCS prescribed grazing plan. The farm also includes considerable acreage in silvopasture—the practice of combining forestry and rotational grazing.



Katie Martin Conservation Educator

Mountain View Dairy Conservation Farm Amelia County

Director Donna Kerr, left, presented a Conservation Farm award to Don Benson, far right, and his wife Janet and their son Rick. The family installed 2,650 feet of stream exclusion fencing. Now the dairy herd waters from 3 troughs located in various pastures, and crosses the stream to the far pasture via a 1,950 square foot stream crossing. A 3,600 sq. ft. animal trail was installed to protect a critical area and assist with the rotation of the herd. In addition, 7 acres of hardwood riparian buffer were installed. Cover crops were planted on over 200 acres for the past 3 years.

Joe Wirt, Jr. Wildlife Steward

Mr. Wirt manages over 90 acres of early successional habitat to maximize the land's ability to sustain a healthy and diverse wildlife population. He uses prescribed burns to control competition from hardwoods, and has 8,000 feet of fire lanes and many volunteers help control the burn. His oak trees are maintained as seed trees should Wirt let the land revert back to hardwoods.

Ms. Marshall made sure the loggers, planters and herbicide sprayers followed good Best Management Practices. Her insistence that the logging road be properly stabilized insured that sediment erosion would not be a problem at the site.

Piedmont SWCD Senior Conservation Specialist Charlie Wootton was elected Vice President of the Virginia Forage and Grassland Council.
